RESCUE, RELIEF AND RECOVERY IN HAITI

The terrible aftermath of the devastating earthquake in Haiti has reminded us once again of the wonderful capacity of humanity to respond to the needs of others. It also reminds us that we need to be clear about the various ways we can help, along with the "phases" of assistance which will be required.

What I learned from working with UMCOR during the floods and emergencies in the Dakotas was that there are three distinct phases to Disaster Response, each one usually taking about ten times as long as the preceding phase. As I best understand it, these are the phases:

Rescue – this is the time when emergency response focuses upon finding survivors, getting them to emergency help, and assessing the size and scope of the tragedy. This Rescue phase is best done by police, fire departments, EMS teams, and in the case of large-scale emergencies, the National Guard and other military. This Rescue phase is what is happening right now in Haiti, and it is limited by the absence of a support system to provide even the most basic of human needs.

Relief – this phase begins during the later part of the Rescue phase, and it usually lasts about 10 times as long as the Rescue phase. This phase is all about helping people to be "safe, secure, and sanitary." In the US, by federal law, this task is given primarily to the Red Cross, and that is also true in international situations with the International Red Cross. We can already see this phase beginning as the Rescue phase continues in Haiti, and the military is helping since the infrastructure is so damaged in Haiti. We can expect this Relief phase to last at least 10 times as long as the Rescue phase (which is itself still on-going, so I imagine that the Relief phase will last many months).

Recovery – this phase, which often lasts 10 times as long as the Relief phase, is the longest and most demanding phase of Disaster Response. It often is led by church groups, faith groups, and other NGO's (non-governmental organizations). UMCOR, our United Methodist Committee on Relief, often begins its work during the Relief phase and continues through the Recovery phase long after the Red Cross and other emergency and relief groups have left the disaster. In the Dakotas, for example, our recovery response to the flood of 1996 continued well into 1998, and

the last VIM team (Volunteer in Mission) worked the recovery about 2 ½ years after the original flood. The goal of Recovery is simply to help people get back to somewhere near their original condition before the disaster.

I share this understanding of the phases of Disaster Response to remind us that the situation in Haiti will require years of relief and recovery. Long after CNN and other news groups have grown weary of reporting the situation, we will need lots of faith groups and other caring persons to help Haiti return to normalcy, or perhaps even to improve its prior situation.

I also share this understanding of Disaster Response as a tribute to the two UMCOR staff persons (Sam Dixon and Clinton Rabb) who died in the recent earthquake. They were in Haiti supervising the on-going Recovery from the floods and hurricanes of two years ago. Their presence is a testimony to how long, hard, and faithfully UMCOR works on these long-term recovery issues. We can be proud of our part in their work, since we all support the basic underlying structures of UMCOR and our other mission work through our United Methodist apportionments, which in Indiana are included in the Tithe budget of the Annual Conference.

Please join me in praying for all who were victims of the Haiti earthquake, and please join me in honoring the memory of Sam Dixon and Clinton Rabb by continuing to support the work of UMCOR.

There are lots of ways to give and help in Haiti, including the immediate ways of supporting the Red Cross. For the long-term recovery, our support of UMCOR will be essential, and it will be a fitting tribute to those who died serving in our name.

STUDY OF SOCIAL PRINCIPLES BEGINS FEBRUARY 24

Rev. Easley will lead a study of "The Social Principles of the United Methodist Church" on 6 Wednesday nights, 6:15 to 7:30 p.m. The "Principles" document is approved by a majority of elected representatives of our denomination and states in broad terms the church's best thinking about how faith and society relate. They speak to issues of individual right behavior, integrity in interpersonal relationship and social justice. This is very much in keeping with the biblical tradition, from the instruction given to Moses and the "Word of the Lord" via Prophets to Jesus himself and later Paul. Our faith affects how we live in society and how we try to work with God to help God's will be "done on earth as in heaven." Of course that will never happen perfectly in our world, nor will people at Central or in the UMC—let alone with all Christians—ever agree 100% on the appropriate response of faith to each issue. Fortunately, the "Social Principles" do not expect or demand that we all agree—we are not an authoritarian church, where a small group can tell everyone what to believe—but church leadership has a right and responsibility to challenge us all, by their own best thinking, to ponder issues for ourselves and dialogue with others about what is a faithful belief in these areas and what we should do in these areas.

All are invited to this study. The greater variety of ages and perspectives we have, the more beneficial it will be. The intent of the study is to seek to ground ourselves in a biblical perspective as we approach issues, to share honestly, listen respectfully and dialogue in ways that let God's Holy Spirit lead us.

BEGIN LENT WITH ASH WEDNESDAY SERVICE—FEBRUARY 17

Begin the holiest season of the Christian year at Central's Ash Wednesday Service, 7:00 p.m. February 17. This day begins the season of Lent, in which we reflect on the unlimited love of God that we see in the life and death of Jesus Christ for humanity. It is also a key time to reflect further on what it means for us to follow Christ, to deepen our discipleship and to find greater joy in living through humble service. **Rev. Easley** will be preaching, the choir singing and the traditional sign of ashes used symbolically.



HUMAN RELATIONS DAY OFFERING — FEBRUARY 7

Because of the Earthquake in Haiti and our desire to encourage immediate gifts toward relief there, we postponed the Human Relations Day offering that was to be taken January 17 in United Methodist Churches. Instead we will receive this offering February 7.

TRUSTEES HAVE APPROVED OTHER GROUP TO USE CHURCH

With the advance knowledge and support of the Church Council, the Trustees approved letting a small congregation that is trying to get started in Evansville use the Garden Room and other areas on the lower level for worship and activities of their congregation on Sunday afternoon, Tuesday and Friday evenings. The Trustees discussed this thoroughly at their January 4 meeting and then spent another two hours at a special meeting the next week to meet the pastor Rev. Hezekiah Murphy and discuss terms with him. Their unanimous conclusion was that we should support fellow Christians who are trying to reach the world with the Gospel and who will very likely appeal to different people than Central. There has also been a long-term feeling here that Central's facilities should be used for the benefit of God's work and the betterment of our community. A Renewed Compassion Church of God in Christ will be paying \$140 per week for use of the facilities and have their own liability insurance. If you see people coming for their services, please introduce yourself and welcome them. If occasions arise where a Central group would like to use the same space at the same time as ARC Church, the Trustees will make every effort to accommodate both groups, and it may mean asking ARC to move to a different part of the building for that time or our own group adapting. Trustees and other volunteers are going to be locking and unlocking the building for them for this 3-month trial as a precaution for all of us and will continue to monitor the arrangement after that, if it continues. They invite your input.

MARRIAGE RENEWAL OPPORTUNITY SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 14

With Valentine's Day falling on a Sunday this year, we will be offering the possibility for you and your spouse to renew your vows following both services. We want to honor the covenant of marriage on that Sunday, and celebrate the many grace-filled marriages here at Central. The Nurture committee will also be hosting a small cake and punch reception following both services.

SPECIAL GIFTS INVITED

By deliberate plan going back two years the Church Council charged the Finance Committee with bringing them a proposed budget for 2010 that did not include a deficit of more than \$4,400, with the intension of having a balanced budget in 2011. This goal was set to get us on as solid a footing as possible for the years ahead. In order to meet this goal several items in the budget were trimmed more than anyone wanted. Some of those were items related to music.

In the past, the church has previously received special gifts (over and beyond people's basic commitments to the annual budget and our capital campaigns) to help fund an item over and beyond what the general budget can handle, including some for special music. We don't want to disrupt our basic giving to the church, but when people feel strongly about additional support for a certain ministry, we want to allow those over-and-above gifts. If you would like to give extra for music or some other item, you are invited to discuss this with the pastor, so the objective of the gift is clear. The Finance Committee could also be consulted.

UNITED METHODIST YOUTH HOME GOES CO-ED

Effective February 1, the United Methodist Youth Home in Evansville will open its doors to teen boys in need. Until now, the home housed only teen girls and their children. With the numerous budget cuts and expenses related to caring for the residents, the UMYH struggles to keep the census numbers at a level to meet their overhead expenses. By including placement of males, they hope to maintain a more consistent number of residents and fill the need to offer a safe haven for boys at risk. The male and female housing units will be segregated, across campus from each other.

Because all of the UMYH supplies are mostly geared toward girls, there is **an immediate, specific need for the following items:**

Twin sheets for teen boys
Twin blankets for teen boys
Towels and Washcloths for males
Men's toiletries; such as deodorant, shampoo, and body wash
Shaving gel and disposable razors

In addition, due to the current financial struggle, the UMYH has been forced to cut costs wherever possible. In the past, there was a pizza party on Wednesday evening for all residents who had no disciplinary or behavioral issues for the week. Unfortunately, this can no longer be offered. In an effort to try to reward positive behavior, the UMYH is **now seeking donations of individually wrapped snack items and 2 liter soft drinks to offer the residents who qualify.**

Other initiatives that will have to be discontinued are the purchase of a birthday cake and one gift for any resident with a birthday. Also seasonal goody bags for Halloween, Valentine's Day, etc. can no longer be offered.



Please consider potential support activities with your Central Sunday School classes, committees, etc. for the UMYH. **Donations of needed items or sponsoring/ conducting an activity on site** with the girls or boys are always a huge hit with them.
