WHY I BELIEVE IN PUBLIC FUNDING FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Most people who will read this article live in a place that they own or rent— and pay for that without help from anyone else. For most of us that seems normal and desirable, and we may well wonder why should it be different for anyone else, other than a family member whom we might help for a while. Otherwise, why should I help pay for housing for others with whom I have no relationship or responsibility? In fact, is not taking my hard-earned money via taxes or fees not only being unfair to me but also coddling others who should take care of themselves and undermining the work ethic?

Those are legitimate questions to ask. I believe there are answers to those that give very good reasons to spend public money to support housing for low-income families. I have come to see that these include not only altruistic, moral and religious reasons but also reasons that are practical, serve my own interest and benefit the community economically. In addition, I have learned that one of the most efficient, effective and flexible vehicles for such public funding is a local affordable housing trust fund, which has ongoing funding through dedicated revenue sources and where decisions are made locally on how best to use the funds. I decided that it was important to share why I support this.

Can you imagine living on a minimum-wage (\$7.25/hr.) job, \$15,000 gross before taxes! Even if a family of four had two minimum-wage earners working fulltime, \$671/mo. is all they could afford for rent and utilities combined! What kind of place could they get for that? Even then only \$361/wk. would be left for all other expenses (food, school, clothing, transportation, household items, medical, insurance, entertainment, etc.). Saving any money would be virtually impossible, so they have no margin for error and no emergency fund. An affordable housing trust fund could help in several ways:

Family Stability: Subsidized housing helps a low-income family control housing expense, keeps it more stable in decent housing, and allows it ultimately to improve their position.

Education Success: In stable housing, children stay in the same school, learn and succeed. Changing schools frequently is a key indicator for school failure, often caused by housing insecurity. This perpetuates the poverty cycle and crime rises—both very costly over time.

Economic Development: Contractors apply for grants from an Affordable Housing Trust Fund to build new housing units, repair existing units or weatherize. Builders get work and create jobs. The grant reduces the contractor's cost, making the units more affordable. The neighborhood appearance and cohesion improves. The local economy gets a ripple effect.

In addition, the principles the Bible consistently teaches tell us God's moral requirements:

I am my brother's keeper. When God asked Cain where Abel was and he replied with a rhetorical question, "Am I my brother's keeper?" God implicitly answered, "Yes." From Genesis 4 on, scripture teaches we have responsibility for our sisters and brothers—and not just close biological kin, since "Brother" and "sister" were the terms used by Jesus and the early church for other members of

the community. Likewise, Jesus' story of the Good Samaritan defines "neighbor" in terms of those in need who are close enough for us to help.

God has a special concern for the poor. Old Testament Law had provisions to make sure "widows, orphans and aliens" (the most vulnerable of society) were given necessities and protection. Through the prophets God condemned leaders for treating the poor unjustly. Jesus said, "In as much as you did it unto the least of these, you did it unto me." (Mt. 25)

God's plan allots a place for every family. Joshua and other early OT books describe the way in which every tribe, every clan and every family was allotted a piece of land on which to live and farm. The Promised Land was *owned by God alone*, but God entrusted a share to each family to use and care for. God knew shares would not remain equal, but laid out a plan for redistribution of the land every fiftieth year ("the Jubilee") so each family again had their own original plot, lest discrepancies of wealth would get larger and larger.

These are not arbitrary rules but tell us how life is designed. Ignoring them brings havoc.

A certain amount of equity benefits everyone. The "common good" is a principle deeply rooted in both scripture and our national founding documents. It implies that what happens to others affect us too. Societies begin to unravel when the "have/have-not" gap becomes too great, when some cannot afford even the basics, when these numbers increase over time, and when parents experience no opportunity and children grow up with no incentive.

As a practical way to address this locally, Congregations Acting for Justice and Empowerment seeks commitment to regular public funding of the Evansville Affordable Housing Trust Fund through dedicated revenue. The amount asked in comparison to government budgets, major capital projects and its taxpayer cost is small, but it improves our community, lets families live in dignity, encourages people to progress, helps children succeed and makes all our lives better. Better housing empowers people, enhances justice in the community and reduces the amount of charity needed by the poor.

I invite you to join me at the CAJE Action 6:30 p.m. April 22 at St. Benedict's Cathedral to stand up for affordable housing and improved transportation (to help people get to jobs and doctors).

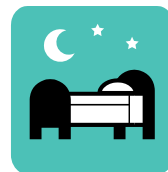
