EMPOWERING PEOPLE TO WORK IS A PART OF JUSTICE

Scripture affirms the value and dignity of work and sees it as part of God's plan for all. Labor, whether physical or mental or some combination, is important. Our efforts and skills let us contribute to the common good of the world and to our own need. We are created to want to make a difference through what we do, whether is it helping to make a product that others needs, provide a service that helps others, managing the efforts of others who are doing so, caring for family or helping as a volunteer for a good cause. Most of us want and need to feel that we contribute in some way.

In both descriptions of creation humans are given responsibilities and work to do: "The Lord God...put the man in the garden...to till it and keep it." (*Gen. 2:15*) The 4th commandment says not only, "Remember the Sabbath day, and keep it holy," thus limiting the amount of work that all do, but also "Six days shall you labor and do all your work." (*Ex. 20:8-9*) In the New Testament Christians shared resources with one another, but each was also expected to do one's part.

Most people work for pay, so it brings income and becomes the major means to provide for the needs of oneself and one's family. Doing all one can to support self and family enhances self-worth, family stability, social harmony and economic functioning. People are not really "helped," if public support or private charity removes incentive to contribute to society and provide for family. Welfare and other government programs were sometimes structured in ways that robbed people of an incentive to work, to the detriment of them, their descendents, the rest of us and the social structure as a whole. A number of reforms in the 80's and 90's tried (largely succeeding) to correct the disincentive to work that some well-intended legislation of the 60's and 70's had brought as their unintended consequences.

I wrote last month to support more public funds for decent, affordable housing for low-income people, particularly increased local funding to the Evansville Affordable Housing Trust Fund. I think it is just and practical from biblical, social and economic perspectives, as I argued. I was very glad that Mayor Jonathan Weinzapfel agreed with this initiative from Congregations Acting for Justice and Empowerment at the CAJE Action on April 22. However, I equally desire that those funds be used in wise ways to assist families who cannot make it totally on their own resources, but also to reinforce the value of work and incentivizing people to try to get ahead and make it on their own. Housing subsidies for low income households typically work on that basis: families pay a portion of the housing costs, usually 30% of their income; the remainder is paid for them. However, as family income goes up, the family pays more on their housing, but still has more to use in other ways. This gives an incentive to better one's self economically, until one needs no subsidies. Both the family and the public benefits.

Yes, some people are lazy and take advantage of such programs. There are people at all levels and in all social groups who are lazy or irresponsible, and none of us like folks to take

every advantage without even trying to pull their weight. Most people in need of housing subsidies are doing the best they can to support themselves. Having safe and reasonable housing meets an immediate need and gives them an opportunity to do their best toward supporting themselves and getting ahead.

Making sure that the least can meet the most basic needs fits the biblical idea of justice, where the edges of the fields, the gleanings of fields and the fruit that fell on the ground couldn't be harvested but was left for the poor. Still, even better than charity is empowering people for self-sufficiency.

CAJE is Congregations Acting for Justice and Empowerment. A prime way to empower is to allow people access to jobs. The second issue CAJE worked on the past 18 months is to expand public transportation to the newer employers on US 41 North beyond the city limits to Ameriquel, where sit several businesses with decent entry-level wages, but some of the people who want those jobs do not have dependable cars, and so cannot get or keep the jobs. Starting a new bus route as CAJE proposed gives people a way to get to jobs and gives those employers a large pool of workers. This initiative has the backing of all three County Commissioners. Lloyd Winnecke says it is something we can do and ought to do. Troy Tornatta and Steve Melcher agree as more people have jobs all are better off. They will ask businesses along the route to share in funding this. It will also require some county funding, which they are requesting in their budget, but the County Council ultimately decides on the requests. CAJE will work with the Commissioner to see the Council provides funding to start the route in 2011. This is an example of the empowerment of people by the dignity of work. I hope you will support this.

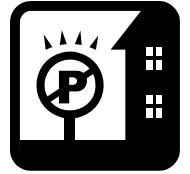
CHURCH WOMEN UNITED MAY FRIENDSHIP DAY

"BED SUNDAY" RESULTS

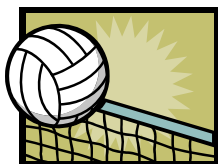

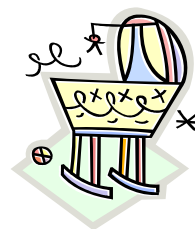

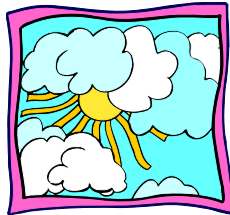
