### CHANGE IS HARD! CHANGE IS NECESSARY!

I love this church and its people! I count it a privilege to celebrate 10 years as your pastor this month. I want to see Central Church continue to be vital for many years to come, and I know you do too. But, vitality is not automatic. It will not be easy to assure. Remaining a center-city church is a challenge, but it is a challenge Central has embraced. It is a challenge we can meet, but not by continuing down the same path. Change involves risk, but not changing is much riskier. We must be willing to change. I am convinced that one of the areas in which we must risk is worship.

The Worship Study Task Force presented its report and recommendations after a joint service on August 15. They then took questions and comments for nearly an hour. I was not surprised at how pained people were as they made comments and as they heard others. We were talking about change to something that is precious to all of us: our worship of God and our sense of church family. It makes sense to be fearful at such a point, fearful of losing our identity. That came out. I have since talked to many people and after the initial response that released some of those feelings, people are drawing on their faith, remembering their commitment to God and this congregation, seeking to understand others equally committed who have different ideas, and trying to think through what is truly the best decision.

On August 17, the Church Council gave the task force additional feedback and then asked it to reconvene to consider all that they had heard, including some very good questions and suggestions. The task force was asked to bring back to the September 14 meeting of the Church Council: 1) the report with any revisions they may make; and 2) a recommendation on how and when to vote on the report. The Church Council will then decide how and when to vote and will let everyone know.

I firmly believe that Central Church needs two worship services. I know many would love one service. I like a fuller Sanctuary too, but I believe not to offer different kinds of worship will doom Central to continued decline and death. We cannot do away with a traditional service. It is the worship many of us grew up with, and it continues to speak to many. However, it does not speak to all who are here now, and it will not appeal to most youth and young adults, especially those who have not grown up in church. Even for those who did, this is not their tradition, and we cannot make “our tradition” meet their needs. They need a more participatory style and music that sounds like other music they hear. This is not even what we have been offering at 8:30. One of the reasons I pushed the creation of this study task force two years ago, was because I believed our “contemporary service” had to change and be updated at least one generation. The task force studied hard and came to the same conclusion: We need to significantly update our approach in that service, and leave the traditional service alone.

To try to blend two different styles into one service will satisfy almost no one for very long. But we can come together several times a year for a wonderful combined service, and that will be easier under the task force’s proposal. We can also continue to share Sunday School and fellowship—and enhance both under the proposed, as I see it. It would take us back to the pre-2000 schedule: Everyone here for Worship at 9:30 and Sunday School following—except there would be two worship options at 9:30.

I initially stayed away from the Worship Study Task Force to give that group space to talk and explore options. They invited Nancy and me to join them at the point they were looking at three options to see the pros and cons of each at its best, before deciding which to recommend. No option was perfect. The task force knew this proposal offered some unique challenges and is working to address these. The “contemporary service planning team” will continue to work at that, once a proposal is approved. However, the other two models considered also had problems and challenges. And when the task force looked at the three possible schedules, everyone on the task force came to the conclusion that the problems of the other two were greater, and neither would serve this congregation as well.

It is risky to try something new, but I believe we should go for it. My human nature has doubts, but my faith says, “Yes, with God’s help!” I believe we should adopt the proposal, try it two years, evaluate it, and make changes that seem wise then. We can do mid-course corrections but should not scrap the plan prematurely. If the plan is not approved, we need to go back to the drawing board to take another look at what we do, because we need to do something. I will support whatever decision is made, as I hope all will. With faith, hope and love let us join together to make it work the best it can.

Change is hard. Change is necessary. God is with us in change. God sometimes calls us to change.

## TASK FORCE CONTINUES ITS WORK

The Worship Study Task Force is meeting again to assimilate feedback received from the congregation. At the presentation August 15 important questions were raised and several good suggestions made, which will be taken into account. On September 14 they will bring their report back to the Church Council with any additions, along with a recommendation on when and how to vote on the recommendations. The Church Council will decide that night how to proceed, and that will be announced to everyone in advance.

## MOST MEETINGS CHANGE TO TUESDAY

The Church Council voted to switch its meetings and that of the Executive Council to the second Tuesday (instead of Monday) of alternating months. This means the next two meeting dates are September 14 & October 12—and both of these dates will be Church Council meetings. They also asked other committees and teams that were meeting on the first or second Monday to change their meetings to the first or second Tuesday, respectively and most will. Pastor Easley asked for this change, so he can keep Monday nights free to visit worship visitors. The Trustees will stay on the first Monday except for September, when they will move off the holiday to Tuesday. The Worship Team will keep meeting on Thursday.

## ENDOWMENT FUND PRESENTATION ON SEPTEMBER 26

The Endowment Fund of Central will distribute over \$43,000 in earnings on September 26. Presentations will be made in the 10:30 service. As the by-laws assume to be the normal case, funds will be divided half and half between “Property Maintenance” and “Service to Others.” Come that Sunday to celebrate the good that can be done through the bequests, memorial gifts and other generous contributions that have come to the fund since 1986. The principal is invested and never spent, but its estimated annual earnings are distributed each year by the fund’s Governing Board, upon request.

August was a busy month at the child care. We had to say good-bye to our kindergarteners. Our summer camp wrapped up with a wonderful “Hollywood Stars” theme talent show. We welcomed new families into the center and most of the children changed classrooms.

We found out that we are the recipients of two grants. The first grant of \$4,600 requested new sand tables with locking lids for the outdoor classroom, the toddler play area and the play area for the older children. The second grant of \$1,500 will be used to purchase new soft play pieces for the indoor toddler area. The current soft pieces are worn and getting holes at the seams.

As fall begins we can look forward to the completion of the small play area by our front door. Grass seed will be sown in this area, so hopefully by spring the children will be able to use it! Thanks to **John Maglinger** for his meticulous care of our playgrounds.

## NEW CARPET IN BASEMENT

The Garden Room and downstairs halls had new carpet re-installed the second and third weeks of August. The Trustees decided at the beginning of January to replace the worn carpet in both areas and use money in the Major Maintenance account from last year’s Endowment distribution for this, and it was installed. However, by late spring some splits had developed in the carpet. The carpet seller was going to have this fixed but also sent a sample back to the factory and discovered the carpet had a flaw and did not pass their test. They gave us choices, one of which was to have the carpet totally replaced, which the Trustees chose. Thanks to **John Maglinger**, who along with Custodian Russ Daugherty, did some of the hard work of pulling up the old carpet in areas where we were required to do that ourselves.

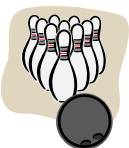

## PARTNER FAMILY, DEBRA SCHNAKENBURG

Debra Schnakenburg had been dreaming for months about the day when she would choose the lot where Habitat for Humanity of Evansville would build her new home. But when it came time to make that selection, one person was missing from her family. Just one month before, her husband, John, passed away suddenly. "I can't believe he's not going to be there and see it," Schnakenburg said, sitting in the Habitat office shortly after selecting her lot. "This meant so much to him." Debra and John Schnakenburg were married for 11½ years. They had two children together, 8-year-old Olivia and 10-year-old John, and Debra has another child, 16-year-old Sam, from her previous marriage. They met one day while Debra was at work at the Executive Inn where she was an auditor. When he asked her out, she was cautious. "I said 'Okay' to a group date, letting him know I was going with my girlfriends, and I would leave with my girlfriends," Schnakenburg said. Schnakenburg, 42, grew up in Evansville and has lived here most of her life. After she graduated high school, she joined the military and served for one year in the U.S. Army until she injured her knees. She has lived in Evansville for most of her life, except for three years when she was in Germany with her first husband. She graduated from the University of Southern Indiana with a bachelor's degree in psychology and works at the Evansville Children Psychiatric Center as a recovery attendant. Her husband started getting sick shortly after she landed her current job, and from then on, his health steadily grew worse, Schnakenburg said. "I was working all the time just to keep up with the normal bills, but his medical bills started getting more and more expensive," she said. "We were sinking slowly each month." When they learned they were approved for a Habitat home, they danced a "jig," Schnakenburg said. "We just couldn't believe it, because it was an answer to our prayers," she said. Schnakenburg now is concentrating on raising her children and making sure she provides for them. Olivia wants a pink room, and John said he just wants to make sure his room isn't too "girly." Sam, the oldest, likes the layout of their new home; they chose the American design with four bedrooms. "I'm hoping this will be a happy new beginning for our family," Schnakenburg said.

*Rev. Easley ministered to Debra and her family at the time of John's sudden death. He was the son of David and Sherri Schnakenburg, the grandson of Richard, and nephew of Karen and Linda Tribble, all members of Central. It is great to see a Central-connected family who went through loss benefitting from a good program like Habitat.*

## NEWS FROM RALPH MILLER

*Ralph Miller's daughter sent this news about her father to Rev. Easley by e-mail in early July:*

My dad is doing well. A month ago, he was in the hospital for 2 weeks with dehydration and pneumonia. One day he was fine and two days later he was hardly talking or doing anything, so we took him to the ER and two weeks later he was released. At present, he is in convalescent center receiving therapy. He is doing well. He is eating better, talkative and visiting with the other residents. It is only 30 beds and 5 min. from our house, so we go see him almost every day. His mind is clear most of the time but it does seem he is getting a little touch of sundowners. We did close on his house 3 weeks ago, that was a blessing. Every-thing went very smoothly. Dad still enjoys getting cards and notes from people at Central. I'm sure he would like for me to send his blessings to all of you. I will try to keep you up to date with any changes. I did tell him that I was sending you a note...I hope the church is doing well.
