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WHAT MAKES FOR PEACE?

Patti and I chose as a Christmas gift for several friends, family, and colleagues copies of The Peace Book. The subtitle of this little paperback book by Louise Diamond is “108 Simple Ways to Make a More Peaceful World.” We were exposed to this book about 4 years ago, when the leader of a retreat Patti and I were attending recommended participants read it in conjunction with attending the retreat. I must confess, I did not read even half the book before the retreat. A second confession: I have still not read the entire book. I could offer the excuse that it is really not the kind of book a person would sit down and read through. It is more like a book of recipes, which you might browse through, find sections that interest you at that point, read a few and decide to try out one of the “recipes.” (To be honest, I think trying to read it cover to cover would produce peace—in the sense of “resting in peace”—i.e. put one to sleep.) After the retreat I got busy with other reading and let this slip into my pile to “Read Eventually.” So, while my personal testimony for the book is at best foggy, I like the book’s concept more and more: presenting simple practical ways to better practice peace in our town lives. My interest in it resurfaced when I got an e-mail from The Peace Company that copies of it were available at a good discount—especially when purchased in volume. This brought together two values I hold: gift ideas I can feel good about and being a “thrifty shopper.” (OK, “cheap.” This article is becoming very confessional!) But the book also got my personal attention as well this time, because the idea sounded so relevant. More peace in my world is very appealing. I want to start reading it a little at a time as part of regular meditation. Even as I write this, I am asking myself whether I want to add this as a part of our regular morning devotions or want to make it part of a second regular time in the day (maybe before bed) when I would stop to consciously focus on God and open my mind and heart to God’s guidance. One person to whom I gave it has already said it fit with their personal goal of living more at peace. It came to mind again as I was corresponding back and forth with someone else on dealing with those sometimes difficult situations in relationships when a person makes what seems like an unreasonable demand. I confess (again) that I have sometime said a harsh “No” that seemed justified, but brought no peace in relation to the other person or even in me, since I felt guilty. Sometime to avoid that I have simply gone along but internally stewed about it, which kept a surface peace, maybe, but did nothing to quell my inner fuming. How much better it is to avoid both of these traps by finding a more peace-

ful, gentle approach within those situations. There are times to stand one’s ground against unreasonable requests, but this can often be done in a pleasant, quiet-but-firm way that includes a smile, celebrates something positive in the other person, maybe offers them something else we are willing to do and puts the accent on other parts of the conversation than on our “No!” to their request. There are other times, when I have learned to say “Yes” to a request I initially wanted to avoid, but to choose to make that my gift to the other person and feel good about it, since it was my choice, not my feeling compelled. Honing my infant skills for gentle and peaceful responses and learning new ones sound like a wonderful way to begin a new year. It will not create, “world peace” but will create more peace in the only places in the world I have much control: within me and in the relationships of my personal circle.

Luke’s Gospel has a touching scene after the beginning of the “Palm Sunday” entry into Jerusalem, where Jesus looks at the city as he approaches and weeps. While Jesus weeps for the beloved city, he says longingly, “If you had only recognized on this day the things that make for peace.” (Luke 19:42)

“The things that make for peace” is a phrase that conjures powerful image in my soul and raises a profound question in my mind: What are the things that do make for peace? My first thought is: If I had a clear, simple answer to that question that I can somehow share and put in action, I would be famous, but how unlikely! However, on second thought, the answer (or answers) I can think of to this question is simple— simpler to say than do, admittedly, but not impossible nor beyond my ability. While I cannot control anyone else, I can choose for myself to Have Peace, Live Peace and Share Peace. That would be good. It is also my wish and prayer for you as 2011 begins.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASSES INVITE YOU AT 10:45

Sunday School gives us an opportunity to join together for fellowship and learning, following our services at 9:30. Central has wonderful classes, which start at 10:45 and now regularly have an uninterrupted 45 minutes for camaraderie and study.

Listed in order from the newest to the most senior our adult classes are: The **Library Class** meets in Room 100, has varied ages, studies various topics and its current study is "Embracing an Adult Faith: What It Means to be a Christian" by Marcus Borg. The **Trinity Class** meets downstairs in Room B2, is mostly young adults, studies varied topics and just began a series on "Growth: Pursuing Spiritual Transformation." The **Compass Class** meets in Room 212, are mostly in their 60s, do topical studies and in January begins "Why We Believe in the Bible" by John Piper. The **4-C'ers Class** meets in Room 211, are mostly mid 70's to mid 80's and have lessons on different topics week to week. The **Fa-Ho-Lo Class** meets in Room 208, are in their 80s and under Jo Wilson's leadership have been going through the New Testament and are now in Hebrews. The **US Class** meets in Room 207, are in their 80s and up, follows the International Bible Lesson Series and even in its 68th year continues to welcome newcomers and have lively discussion. The **Togadore Class** meets in Room 109, all women (50s to 90s) and, after years on the International Bible Lesson Series and going through the New Testament, is now on Exodus in the Old. In addition, short-term studies will also be offered from time to time, the first on the Psalms.



The **Youth Class** has high school and middle school students, is taught by David White and meets in Room 204. **Children** (preschool through 5th Grade) focus on a biblical story 4 weeks and rotate among varied learning activities, with all meeting in Room 106 to begin and then disperse by age groupings to their weekly activities. **Children ages 2 and 3** meet in Room 107 to learn Christian faith and Bible stories in age-appropriate ways. The **Nursery** for Infants and Toddlers meets all morning in Room 05.

CHILDREN'S SUNDAY SCHOOL FOR JANUARY

The children will be studying Jesus as a boy during the month of January. We will learn a little about the Hebrew alphabet, learn a Jewish song and dance, enact the drama of Mary and Joseph looking for the lost Jesus, and we will make sandals like Jesus might have worn as a boy. CHURCH COUNCIL SETS 2011 GOAL

We enter 2011 with a clear church goal and a balanced budget! On December 14, the Church Council adopted as the 2011 Church Goal: Growth in Membership, Discipleship, and Service through Radical Hospitality, Passionate Worship, Intentional Faith Development, Risk-Taking Mission and Service, and Extravagant Generosity.

It also accepted the following Vision to further elaborate on this goal:

Since "The Mission of the Church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world," the goal

of Central United Methodist Church is to fulfill Jesus' Great Commission by growing in membership, discipleship and service. All ministries, committees, and teams will focus on supporting this goal through the five fruitful practices of Radical Hospitality, Passionate Worship, Intentional Faith Development, Risk-Taking Mission and Service and Extravagant Generosity. Ministries, programs and strategies will be evaluated in light of these by the Executive Council at its bimonthly meetings.

We may keep this goal and vision multiple years and rotate annual focus on one of the fruitful practices. In light of the new worship schedule we are trying this year the consensus was that "Passionate Worship" will be our 2011 focus.

By hard work on the part of the Staff-Parish Relations and Finance Committee and a major blessing from Child Care, along with a couple of smaller blessings, the 2011 budget is virtually balanced (now less than \$1,000 in projected deficit). When SPRC was meeting a week before the Church Council to make \$6,000 in mandated cuts, we learned that Child Care was giving an additional \$10,000 in income to the church for 2011, based on a very good year they had in 2010. That unanticipated gift and good work of SPRC to find most of the cuts without major damage made the budget work as well as it did.

RALPH MILLER ANNUITY BLESSES CHURCH

Ralph Miller blessed the United Methodist Church and its predecessors with nearly 70 years of ministry—the last 26 years in retirement at Central. He was faithful and generous to the church during his life and made provision for that to continue on his death. He bought an annuity that at his death would be divided in equal shares among Central, the Conference Foundation, his seminary and his college (U.E.). The church's share of the cash value of the annuity was \$11,852. Since it is left to "Central United Methodist Church" without any specific designation, it has been divided according to church policy made in 2004 and 2005. \$5,926 (half of the total) went to Endowment Fund and a quarter (\$2,963) each to Trustee Major Maintenance and to church debt. This is a wonderful gift of a very faithful man, and we celebrate.
