
“BROTHER’S KEEPER” – OUR CONNECTION

“Am I my brother’s keeper?” was Cain’s response in Genesis 4 to God’s questions, “Where is your brother Abel?” Cain deflected God’s inquiry, because in jealousy he had killed his brother. While not guilty of such overt acts of evil, we may use that same question to avoid responsibility to others and defend ourselves in the light of our sins of omission. In God’s sight we are all our “brothers’ keepers.”

“Brothers Keeper” is the name chosen for a wonderful ministry that helps non-violent ex-offenders successfully reintegrate into society as responsible, law-abiding citizens. It uses models of Christian discipleship, mutual responsibility, personal accountability and supportive community to help guide the continued reshaping of lives in a good direction. It grew from the work of Bob Collins and the Tri-State Men’s Center. After many years of ministering to inmates at Branchville Correctional Facility to help them discover Christ and begin a life of following Christ, Bob realized these men needed a place to come after incarceration to continue their Christian journey and rebuild their lives.

Most inmates have burned their bridges before they get to prison. Ones who had good families and supportive friendship have often alienated these folk by their bad deeds, to the point that family and friends have given up and want nothing to do with the ex-offender on his return. Some offenders never had positive relations to begin with. A man leaving prison with \$75, the clothes on their back and the title of “ex-felon” to put to every job application has a steep uphill climb. If one also has no healthy, supportive family to rely on, it would be hard to avoid falling back into crime. Without some help, few of us would know how to handle that situation. Brother’s Keeper provides a place to live, a strict code of behavior, a network of accountability and support, the expectation to find and keep a job, and a strong program teaching and modeling discipleship. It occupies part of the former Johann funeral home at Garfield and Illinois Street, 0.3 mile from the church, operating a solid program on less than a shoe-string budget.

10 to 12 men are in Brother’s Keeper program. Inmates pay a portion of their earnings for their room and board. Beyond that its remaining money comes from donations from churches. Bob donates his time—a considerable amount of it—to this ministry. Others give their time and labor. They seek to develop a network of partner churches to support this ministry. This is one of the places volunteers from Central may serve on Change the World Sunday, May 15. It could begin a partnership of support with this vital ministry. We can share in their progress to dignity, self-sufficiency and lives of faith. We may share in more costs to society in safety and criminal-justice expenses, if we do not help, since they remain part of our “family system.” Instead, I hope we will claim them as our brothers and help.

CAJE ACTION MAKES A DIFFERENCE

Around 1300 people fulfilled the biblical call to work for justice by attending the Congregations Acting for Justice and Empowerment Nehemiah Action on Monday, April 11 at Crossroads Christian Church. Those assembled heard from a young girl, Jenny Roy, who at one time was living in a car with her father. Dr. Vince Bertram heard Jenny’s story and answered “Yes” to all questions he was asked that related to youth homelessness. He agreed to ensure that training is provided for school personnel to identify and respond to homeless children and youth with appropriate referrals. EVSC will also provide life-skills classes that will prepare young adults for independence, especially for those who are homeless and those aging out of foster care. The CAJE team will continue to work with Dr. Bertram and his successor at the EVSC to ensure that homeless children are identified, their needs are met, and none of them fall through the cracks of the system.

Another issue concerned former offenders who are returning to society in search of jobs that will enable them to break the cycle of recidivism. Mayor Jonathon Weinzapfel sent a letter expressing his immediate support of “banning the box.” This will remove a prominent question from city job applications that asks if applicants were convicted of a felony in the past seven years. Background checks will, of course, continue after an applicant’s qualifications are considered, but all applicants can now be considered for jobs where they are not in contact with a vulnerable population or with money. Three candidates for mayor, Lloyd Winnecke, Troy Tornatta, and Rick Davis all agreed that, if elected, they will ensure that the “box” will continue to be eliminated from city job applications.

Elliott Kavanaugh, the CAJE co-chair of the Transportation Team working on a new bus route for north Hwy. 41, reminded the county leadership and assembly that a budget is a moral document that represents a community’s priorities. He urged the Vanderburgh County representatives to make workers a priority and help them get to jobs on north Hwy 41. Ruth Dunbar, a 16-year Ameriquel employee, shared her difficulties getting to work every day without a reliable vehicle. Her struggles are shared by many other workers. All County Commissioners and four County Council members answered yes to questions posed to them about working in “good faith” to find the necessary funds to make the new bus route a reality.

The presence of so many justice-minded individuals definitely helped make a difference. A difference that will ensure that our community is a place where justice flows – a place where those who want to work have public transportation to help them get to work; a place where returning offenders who have paid their debt to society can look for a job on a more even playing field; and a place where the schools are working to identify students who are struggling with homelessness and help meet their needs.

REMEMBRANCE OF MEMBERS MOVED TO ALL SAINTS

Central has a long history of an annual remembrance of members who have died in the past year on the Sunday of Memorial Day weekend. The Worship Team wants to continue that tradition but move it to a holy day in the church calendar that is specifically designed for such a remembrance: The first Sunday of November. November 1 was set aside by the church centuries ago to remember all those who had lived and died as followers of Jesus Christ, which in New Testament terminology made them “saints”—not in the sense of being perfect but as “being set aside for God.” Some especially exemplary Christians were “canonized” (formally recognized) and given a specific day for remembrance. But the many other “saints” without their own day were remembered on All Saints Day, November 1. Reportedly this was a liturgical feast day that Methodist founder John Wesley found especially meaningful. Still, in general All Saints Day did not get the recognition to become a holiday and thus allow people to gather on this day to worship, so in recent decades in many Christian traditions (United Methodist prominent among them), the first Sunday of November has been celebrated as All Saints Sunday and has been a day in the church calendar to remember the “saints” in each local congregation. It is appropriate on a day of remembering to remember to celebrate communion, where we remember Jesus’ gift to us of his body and blood and our communion around his table with all Christians, on earth and in glory. The first Sunday of November is a regular communion Sunday and in our new schedule is a day we have everyone in one service, both of which make it a very appropriate day for sharing in memory of those of our membership who have entered eternity in the previous year (or 17 months in 2011, because we are making the change now). So we will not be remembering deceased members this year in May but on November 6. On May 29, we will recognize that the next day is an national holiday to remember those who have died in wars.

His funeral was on Sunday, March 20, with burial at Alexander Memorial Park....and to the family and friends of Don Koch who died March 26. Don’s family included sister-in-law, **Kay**, and brother-in-law, **Ned Conder**. Don was married to **Kay’s** twin Gay over 40 years. Gay’s church was always his second home and returned here after her death. His memorial service was April 9 at Holy Rosary where he also attended....and to Charles Boberg and family on the death of his mother, M. Marcella Boberg who died April 14. She was 86 and living at Good Samaritan Home. . . and to Shirley Martin (a member of Central until she and Tom moved to Lexington) on the death recently of her father, Sam Hayes of Shelbyville Kentucky.

IF INDIVIDUALLY ASKED FOR HELP

If an individual who is not in your family or in another close relationship asks you for assistance, it is best generally to let that assistance be handled in a corporate way through the church. On occasion someone has come into the building, while people were at church and asked for financial assistance of some kind; it is best to refer such requests to the church staff, rather than individually giving money, even if it means they may have to come back at another time. You might simply say, “I am (*we are*) not in a position to assist, but our pastor (*or other staff*) would be glad to see what the church can do.” In general, if you are approached through the church with what seems like an unusual request for personal assistance or one that makes you somewhat uncomfortable, refer this to the pastor or discuss the matter with him before acting.
